FROM THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY

A Message to Our Happy Valley Community,

The Happy Valley Public Safety Department provides far more than a public safety program to the community--our department has integrated numerous enhanced services to meet and exceed the needs of Happy Valley's residents, schools, community groups, businesses, and visitors. I firmly believe that a comprehensive public safety program is essential for the livability of any community. In Happy Valley, we have a thoughtful, well-defined public safety program that encompasses the City, law enforcement, emergency responders and citizen volunteers. I am very proud of the work this public safety team accomplished in 2016. Our efforts are outlined in this report and I invite you to read it.

Code Enforcement, Animal Control and Crime Prevention is led by CSO Supervisor Ryan Kersey. His team consists of two uniformed community services officers. In their role, they receive neighborhood livability concerns, animal welfare complaints, and violations of the Municipal Code, along with assist with traffic investigations and promote crime prevention tools to neighbors and business owners.

The Happy Valley Police Department is led by Chief Scott Anderson. Chief Anderson oversees the operation of patrol, traffic enforcement and investigations. The Happy Valley community receives around the clock, dedicated police services. We currently have 11 sworn police officers and a community service officer who provide service to the city 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Public Safety's Emergency Management is led by our Emergency Operations Team that consists of Steve Campbell, Chris Randall and Ryan Kersey. This team focuses on emergency preparedness and response in the event of natural or man-made disaster.

Municipal Court Services is led by Senior Court Clerk, Lisa Tamlyn. The Honorable Larry Blake Jr. presides over traffic and code enforcement cases. There are two Court Clerks who, by order, adjudicate roughly 70% of the cases each month. In addition, the court offers traffic, and fireworks diversion classes for adults and minors who qualify.

Juvenile Diversion Program is led by Ed Miller. Ed meets with youth offenders and their families to discuss the harm caused by their actions and held meaningfully accountable.

The Happy Valley Public Safety Team is continuously looking to improve its operations while being fiscally responsible. We believe our public safety efforts are enhanced through community interaction. I encourage residents, business owners and visitors in our community to take advantage of the many opportunities to interact with our emergency responders. We are here to protect, serve and enhance the quality of life our community members deserve.






HAPPY VALLEY JUVENILE DIVERSION PROGRAM

FIRST TIME OFFENDERS WHO ARE CONSIDERED LOW RISK COME BEFORE THE PANEL AND ARE HELD ACCOUNTABLE FOR THEIR OFFENSES WHICH TYPICALLY INCLUDE RUNAWAY, POSSESSION OF ALCOHOL, CURFEW, CRIMINAL MISCHIEF OR THEFT.




HAPPY VALLEY MUNICIPAL COURT

HAPPY VALLEY MUNICIPAL COURT DEALS WITH THE ADJUDICATION OF CITATIONS ISSUED TO DRIVERS FOR TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS, WEIGH MASTER CITATIONS AND PARKING TICKETS, AS WELL AS THOSE IN VIOLATION OF THE CITY'S MUNICIPAL CODE. THE COURT CLERKS SERVE AS VIOLATIONS BUREAU STAFF ON A DAILY BASIS, RESOLVING THOSE MATTERS THAT DO NOT REQUIRE AN APPEARANCE BEFORE THE MUNICIPAL COURT JUDGE.


MOST COMMON VIOLATIONS BY YEAR



CRIME PREVENTION FOCUSES ON NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY THROUGH THE EDUCATION AND COOPERATION OF CITY RESIDENTS, AND IS PROMOTED THROUGH THE EFFORTS OF THE CITY'S LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY, ITS MUNICIPAL CODE OFFICERS AND VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY WATCH MEMBERS.

Certifications:

The City has two Code Enforcement Officer's which are certified as Crime Prevention Specialists by the Crime Prevention Association of Oregon.

Community Watch:

The Community Watch Program is operating and has volunteers who provide a presence in our City Parks & Trails. They are also active with National Night Out and other community safety projects, which include holiday shopping handouts to prevent theft from vehicles and homes.

Home Security Surveys:

The Home Security Survey program includes victim follow-up with the help of the Happy Valley Police. A form is provided for citizens to document their valuables to ensure they have the appropriate information should they fall victim to crime.

Business Security Surveys:

This program, including a Vulnerability Assessment, is offered to local businesses in Happy Valley introducing the City's crime prevention staff and services to business owners. An additional questionnaire is used to collect information to pass on to Dispatch, Happy Valley Police and Crime Prevention.

Neighborhood Watch Programs:

Neighborhood Watch Programs, established in several neighborhoods, has proven very successful. The City provides guidance for neighborhoods and HOA's to establish a Neighborhood Watch and partner with Happy Valley Police to focus on the direct needs of each community.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

Teen Driver Safety Event - Through the use of driving simulators and 'impairment goggles' the teens witness first-hand how their driving skills are impacted should they make the decision to drive distracted (cellphones, texting, etc.), speed or drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol. The Happy Valley Youth Council continues to look for new and important ways to make a positive peer-to-peer impact, and make their community a better and safer place to live.



Rx Drug Turn in – Happy Valley Youth Council and the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office all partner for an annual drug turn-in at Happy Valley City Hall. Youth Council students volunteer to help collect prescription drugs no longer wanted, removing them from homes and possible misuse. All drugs collected are then turned over to the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office for destruction through the DEA.


Our Mission




Yearly Calls for Service

City of Happy Valley Population with percentage of change from previous year




Happy Valley PD Staffing
















2016 Citations Issued





Happy Valley Traffic Crash Reports 2016




Top 5 Intersections with highest number of Traffic Crash calls for service in 2016





* On 8/17/16 at 8:15PM multiple CCSO and HVPD units responded to a shooting in the parking lot of the New Hope Church in Happy Valley, Oregon.

* Initial responders located the victim, a known gang member, bleeding in the parking lot from multiple small caliber gunshot wounds. **Eleven .22 long rifle casings** were later located at the scene.



* Witnesses reported two suspects fled the scene, one on foot and one on a bicycle towards the Clackamas Town Center. Patrol units were not able to locate the suspects. The victim is interviewed and says he does not know the person who shot him.

* HVPD and CCSO Detectives investigated and learned a juvenile associated with a rival gang of the victim was with another man who intended to fight the victim.

*Detective Smith wrote an arrest warrant affidavit for the juvenile suspect for attempted murder.

On 8/24/16, U.S. Marshalls arrested the suspect. Detective Smith wrote a search warrant for the residence he was staying and, with the assistance of HVPD patrol units and CCSO Detectives, located clothing Mr. Petrie likely wore during the shooting, along with (16) rounds of .22 long rifle ammunition. The next day, Detectives Smith and Miller located and recovered the bike from the shooting:



Detective Smith wrote a search warrant for the suspect's cell phone and discovered text messages AND a "selfie" rap video he made which detailed the shooting.

The suspect plead guilty to Attempted Murder and was sentenced to 90 months in prison on 10/21/16. He is scheduled to be released in February 2024.

- February 2016 HVPD contacts 88 year old Happy Valley resident on the suspicion she was being financially exploited by her 26 year old granddaughter. The suspect was living in the victim's home.
- Case assigned to HV detective in July of 2016. Review of victims' numerous bank records, found what appeared to be extensive forged checks and credit card fraud. 2nd interview of victim corroborated what original Deputy saw.
- Suspect contacted and arrested August of 2016 on an unrelated warrant. She had illegal drugs in her vehicle at the time of her arrest. She confessed to forging the checks to her grandmother's accounts due to a drug habit.
- Financial review of victim's accounts and found the suspect had stolen approximately \$115,000 through forgery and credit card fraud, in less than one year.
- Suspect was indicted by a Clackamas County Grand Jury on **six counts of Aggravated Theft, seven counts of Forgery in the First Degree, and Theft in the First Degree** charges in December of 2016.
- HVPD patrol and detective located and arrested suspect in Southeast Portland and she is currently in custody at the Clackamas County Jail on the above charges.

11/15/16 0805: HAPPY VALLEY, Ore. (KOIN) – A deputy with the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office was shot early Tuesday morning while investigating a traffic crash, and bystanders helped the wounded deputy during the incident.

The incident was reported shortly before 6:30 a.m. near the intersection of Southeast Sunnyside Road and Southeast 139th.

11/16/16: (Oregonian) Deputy Robert Cordova was shot in the leg during an altercation with Steven W. Wilson, who was also injured, Clackamas County sheriff's spokesman Sgt. Brian Jensen said.

Cordova was placed on administrative leave while the sheriff's office investigates the shooting, which is standard practice, Jensen said. He has been a deputy for the sheriff's office since July 2015. He is working with the Happy Valley Police under a contract with the sheriff's office, Jensen said.

The shooting began after Cordova responded to a car crash in Happy Valley. Wilson had been hit by a car on Southeast Sunnyside Road and 139th Avenue early Tuesday morning, Jensen said. Cordova responded and shortly after got into an altercation with Wilson, Jensen said. -- Samantha Matsumoto smatsumoto@oregonian.com

11/16/16: OREGON CITY, Ore. (KOIN) – The man accused of trying to kill a Clackamas County Sheriff's deputy has been booked into jail. Steven William Wilson is now charged with one count of attempted aggravated murder with a firearm and one count of second-degree assault with a firearm.

KOIN 6 News has learned that Wilson was able to grab hold of Cordova's department-issued gun and used it to shoot Cordova in the leg.
