SAFE OREGON

All kids should feel safe at school and in their communities. SafeOregon gives kids, parents, schools and their communities a way to report safety threats or potential acts of violence. Together, we'll empower people to speak out and spark change.



- Coral Smith is the central records director at Oregon State Police. The statewide school safety tip line, SafeOregon, is one of the programs within her division. She has worked for Oregon Department of Human Services for 6 years prior to working at OSP for the last 2 years. She attended school in the Salem-Keizer school district growing up, and is dedicated to public service and ensuring schools are safe for everyone.
- WHAT IS SAFEOREGON? SafeOregon is a tip line. Did someone hurt you? Do you know about someone who might hurt you or other people? Do you know about a danger to students, school staff, or your school? Are you struggling? Do you need help from an adult and you're not sure who to tell? You can tell SafeOregon
- SAFEOREGON IS PRIVATE. SafeOregon is checked 24/7. Your tip is private. Your name will not be shared unless you want to share it. People who work at SafeOregon will look at your tip. Then they send it to school employees and possibly law enforcement.

Anonymous

- Don't leave your name or contact information
- Provide as much info as possible

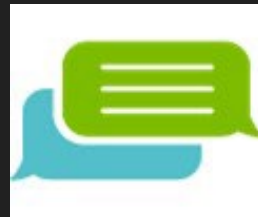
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

SUBMITTING A TIP

- School Name
- Who are you?
- Where did you hear or see this incident?
- When did it happen?
- How many times has this situation happened?
- Have you reported this to an adult?

What Happens to the Tip?

- Sent to School Principal, Vice Principal, Counselor, or other designated school contact
- If URGENT or CRITICAL, 911 may also be called
- They determine what can be done to help



Over 9,000 Tips Received

- Bullying
- Drugs
- Students hurting themselves
- Threat to Safety
- Sexual Assault/Harassment



Fake Tips



- Sending a fake tip to SafeOregon is against the law.
- False reports, pranks, or jokes may be investigated by police.

Things to Consider

- Do students know about the tip line at your school?
- Are there groups that may not feel comfortable using tip line?
- Does your school climate encourage reporting?



How can you help?

- Meet with your administration and talk about ways to promote the tip line in your school
- Educate your friends and peers on what the tip line is for and when to use it
- Show people the website and mobile app
- Create your own videos, podcasts, advertising campaigns, posters and more

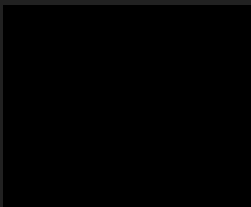
