When it comes to building community trust and strengthening relationships between residents and law enforcement, sometimes the best approach is hands-on. For one Happy Valley student, that idea became a reality during a special experience that placed him right in the center of local policing.

Axel Sackos, a student at Happy Valley Elementary, recently had the unique opportunity to serve as "Chief for a Day" — an unforgettable afternoon that gave him a behindthe-scenes look at law enforcement in action. 



Prevent and control campfire hazards

A campfire can quickly get out of control if not handled properly, so keep these tips top of mind

It's summer, and that means more people will be outside building recreational and cooking fires. Whether camping or enjoying a summer night in your backyard, Clackamas Fire wants to keep you and your family safe

by sharing some safety tips from the National Fire Protection Association.

Before setting up a campfire, be sure it's permitted.

Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves. Place rocks in a circle around your fire area.



Summer is synonymous with campfires and relaxing in the majestic beauty of the great outdoors. Be sure to stay alert and keep these safety tips in mind the next time you build a campfire of your own.

Never use gasoline or other flammables, or combustible liquids.

> Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel and dirt or sand nearby to put out the fire. Make

sure to put it entirely out before leaving the site.

Keep a compfire small

Keep a campfire small, which is easier to control, and never leave campfires unattended.

Don't let children or

pets stand too close or play near the fire.

Don't let children add wood or debris to the fire.

If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop, and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.

Treat a burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for three to five minutes and cover with a clean, dry cloth. Seek medical help if needed.



COUNCIL CORNER

Passage of the community center bond measure could mean construction beginning in 2026

In July, the City Council approved a resolution for voter consideration of a bond measure to fund the Community Center.

During the next several weeks, the City will draft fact-based educational materials about the measure. In the meantime, here is what's expected to appear on the ballot in November:

CAPTION: BONDS FOR COMMUNITY CENTER

QUESTION: Shall City provide a Community Center for people to gather; issue up to \$50 million in bonds?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT:

This measure asks if the City should provide a Community Center for people to gather and issue bonds, which, along with \$20 million the City has already saved for the project, would finance the facility and related site improvements.

Previous city-wide surveys

have indicated a desire for a central location for the community to gather, connect, recreate, swim, and participate in sports and other activities.

The City proactively purchased 40 acres east of 172nd Avenue near the Scouters Mountain roundabout to be the location for the Community Center and a future park. To ensure the project would be shovel-ready if this measure is approved, the City hired a design team to finalize the layout and design of the Community Center. Additionally, the City conducted a competitive process to select a Construction Manager / General Contractor to inform the design team on the constructability of the design, provide feedback on cost-effective strategies, and develop a construction timeline. Cost estimates have been provided by the contractor as well as an independent third-party cost evaluator. The purpose of these steps is to provide greater clarity on the City's ability to deliver the project, should it be approved by voters.

To inform the layout and design, the City gathered several focus groups, conducted multiple surveys, and established a Steering Committee of Happy Valley residents to provide input on what a future Community Center could include. Based on input received from the community, the community center is expected to include:

- Recreation swimming pool
- Multi-purpose gymnasium
- Indoor walking and jogging track
- Community room with catering kitchen
 - lacktriangle Reservable gathering space
 - Weight and cardio spaces
 - Group exercise room
 - Space for childcare services

If approved, construction is expected to begin in Spring 2026. Completion is targeted for early 2028.

Programs would be developed by the City Parks and Recreation team with input from the community. The City may seek partnerships with local recreation and fitness businesses to provide programs at the Community Center. Programs are designed for families, seniors, youth, and those in between.

The voter-approved Parks and Recreation Levy currently funds maintenance of existing parks and recreation programs, but does not raise enough funds to provide a new Community Center.

If approved, this measure authorizes the issuance of a principal amount of \$50 million of general obligation bonds to finance capital costs associated with providing a Community Center and related site improvements. Bond funds would be combined with over \$20 million that the City has saved for this project and \$5 million that the Oregon Legislature has dedicated towards the project.

The estimated annual tax rate for bonds would be \$0.51 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The median home in Happy Valley has a market value of \$660,000 and a corresponding assessed value of \$360,000, which would result in an annual tax payment of approximately \$184. The actual tax rate and amount may differ due to changes in interest rates and assessed value. Bonds may be issued in multiple series, each maturing within 26 years of issuance.

Mayor receives Chamber of Commerce Lifetime Achievement Award

In July, Mayor Tom Ellis was awarded the Irwin Adams Lifetime Achievement Award by the North Clackamas Chamber of Commerce. This award is presented annually to recognize an outstanding individual whose long-term commitment, generosity, and leadership have had a profound and lasting impact on the community.

As mayor, Ellis has been instrumental in prioritizing infrastructure projects,

including the Superblock sidewalk improvements, library expansion, and a future community center, among others. While big projects take a lot of effort, it's the little things that have made the most impact. Things like visiting schools to encourage students to participate in the "If I Were Mayor" contest, and teaching second graders about city government on their tours of City Hall.

Ellis was elected to serve as mayor, beginning January 2019, and re-elected to serve,

beginning January 2023. He served on the Planning Commission for six years, including a one-year term as chair. In 2011, he was appointed to the city council, was elected to the council in 2012, and re-elected in 2016. He served as council president from 2017 to 2018.

Tom is a small business owner and a U.S. Coast Guard Veteran. He and his wife, Jennifer, have been married for more than 33 years. They have called Happy Valley home for more than 18 years.

Fourth of July for many — once in a lifetime for one Local hero, Lawrence Roque, leads family festival parade

For many families, Fourth of July at Happy Valley Park has become a multi-generational tradition that seamlessly blends everything the holiday represents, including patriotism, nostalgia, reverence, and celebration.

From afternoon baseball and parades to evening cookouts and fireworks, the Fourth of July at Happy Valley Park was yet another success, evolving over the years much like the community that partakes in it.

However, this particular day meant much more for one Happy Valley local, who took center stage to lead the Fourth of July Family Festival, marking an overwhelmingly triumphant experience.

Lawrence Roque, a former East coast native turned Happy Valley local was honored with the title of this year's "Grand Marshal" at the Happy Valley Fourth of July Family Festival, leading the way for this year's parade participants as he strolled down what's been locally dubbed as the "longest shortest parade this side of the Mississippi."

"I was drafted to the Army during the Korean war when I was 18 years old," says Roque. "The last three months of my service I was actually loaned out to the Air Force driving a large truck with a large drill attached, digging post holes. It was actually fun!"

Roque, who is 90 years young, went on to detail how he was asked to be a part of the

"I was so excited," says Roque. "My daughter, Jennifer, sent in a photo of me at the memorial next to City Hall and, from what I hear, Mayor Ellis reached out to see if I'd like to be Grand Marshal. I couldn't say 'yes' fast enough. I really couldn't believe that they even asked."

Roque went on to discuss the big day, arriving at the start of the route around 11:30 a.m., where members of the Army National Guard asked Roque which vehicle he wanted to ride in.

"I decided to ride in the Humvee because it was open on top and I could stand," said Roque. "I was very nervous but also very excited. It was really an honor and I loved every single minute of it. The people in Oregon — especially Happy Valley — are so friendly. I took a picture with at least 50 different people at the park once the parade was over."

Taking not one moment for granted, Roque then talked about how, after the parade, he and his wife drove around Happy Valley Park while each carrying a small basket with dog biscuits to hand out to all

the furry companions taking part in the festivities, possibly taking their minds off those scary fireworks.

Afterward, Grand Marshal Roque retired from the community festivities to return to his daughter's home, taking in some much-needed family time to cap off what was a special day.

"My daughter arranged a party at her house at 4 o-clock on the fourth, so after some time at the park we went back to her place and watched the Happy Valley fireworks from her home," says Roque. "It was a day that I will never ever forset"





Summer Sounds: Keeping noise in check in Happy Valley

Warm weather means more time outdoors — barbecues, yard work, and late-night gatherings with friends. While we love seeing our neighbors enjoy the summer, it's essential to keep noise levels at a reasonable level so everyone can enjoy their homes peacefully.

As your Community Service Officers, we're here to help ensure Happy Valley remains a welcoming and respectful place to live. At this time of year, we often see an increase in noise complaints. Whether it's music, barking dogs, or ongoing construction, we're available to help mediate and address concerns before they become bigger issues.

Know your quiet hours

In Happy Valley, quiet hours are from 10 p.m. to 7 a.m. (City Ordinance 8.08.310). During this time, loud, repetitive, or amplified noises. such as loud conversations, power tools, or basketball games, can carry more easily and may disturb your neighbors. If noise continues despite a warning, it could result in a citation.

Start with a conversation

Often, noise issues can be resolved through a simple and respectful conversation. Your neighbor may not even realize their noise is carrying. If you feel comfortable, try reaching out directly before filing a complaint. But if you're unable to have that conversation or if the issue continues, we're here to help.

When and how to report a noise

Daytime Complaints (8 a.m. – 6 p.m.): These include issues such as barking dogs, construction noise, and loud music. Community Service Officers respond to these concerns. Submit a report online at hv.city/report-a-concern or call 503-783-3800.

After-Hours Complaints: For noise issues during evening or overnight hours, contact the Happy



Being mindful of noise levels is key to being a good neighbor.

Valley Police through their nonemergency line at 503-655-8211.

How noise is evaluated?

We use decibel meters to evaluate sound levels. When a complaint is made, a Community Service Officer will measure the noise from a nearby public location, like a sidewalk or driveway. If levels exceed the allowed limit, a citation may be issued.

Please note: If a citation is issued,

the complainant must attend Municipal Court to testify. Without the complainant's participation, the case will be dismissed.

Construction noise rules

Construction is only permitted Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday through Sunday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Construction activity outside of these hours is not allowed. regardless of whether the work is professional or DIY.

What About Barking Dogs?

An occasional bark is no problem. But incessant barking that disrupts the neighborhood could be a violation of the City's Animal Regulation ordinance (6.04.030). This applies to barking, whining, or howling that can be heard beyond the owner's property. You can report excessive dog noise using our Report a Concern form. Jazzercise: A Fitness Classic Endures 50-years later

In an ever-evolving world of fitness, it's almost impossible to keep up with today's trends, as with every new niche workout comes the disappearance of a once-beloved practice.

The shake weight? Now a relic. Thighmasters and vibrating belts? Perhaps your next great garage sale find. Even group classes, such as step aerobics, have been difficult to come by over the years.

However, for one famous group workout that dates back to 1969, its endurance has shown that fitness isn't just about staying healthy, but also the community and fun that comes along with it.

We've experienced it all and have grown this community together. I also believe it's the retention. People come once and love to do it again. We want everyone to be successful and not leave a class feeling discouraged."

"We also modify based on age, bodies, experience, etc," adds Ewers. "We show options that are for everybody which has created longevity. It really has become multigenerational for a lot of families."

Currently, Happy Valley Jazzercise is offering new clients a free week to experience unlimited workouts. Equally, they offer a collection of studio memberships, including an annual pass, pay as you go, class packs, etc.

"We also livestream our workouts for those who are stuck at home or traveling," says Ewers.

Equally, underscoring the idea of community, both Ewers and Fox discussed some annual events they participate in, including a "Pink Out" in October, where they partner with a nonprofit to help fight breast cancer.

"We all wear pink and deck out the entire studio in pink," says Ewers. "We try to give back to the community however we can."

"We're also very organic," adds Fox. "We'll have fundraising events and classes if someone in our class is going through a hard time and needs a hand. We also celebrate birthdays and celebrate weddings. We're engaged with one another which makes it amazing."



goodies," says Kiser. "We also offer plenty of snacks."



Given the variety and condition of cars brought to the event, excitement was revved up across the board.



Oregon Military Museum celebrates grand reopening

regonians know that they live in a state with a rich history. Now, they have a museum that brings the state's military history front and center.

The Oregon Military Museum, located at Camp Withycombe in Happy Valley, held its grand reopening during the weekend of July 10-12, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on July 12 and the unveiling of the We Are Oregon exhibit. This exhibit highlights Oregon's military contributions from its earliest days to the present, offering an immersive experience into the lives, sacrifices, and stories of Oregonians who served

With the reopening, the museum is now open to the public Wednesdays through Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., free of charge.

Visitors will be treated to previously unseen exhibits and artifacts. The Drill Floor Gallery serves as the museum's primary permanent exhibit, covering the state's military history chronologically through displays of artifacts, photographs and personal stories. The new Weapons Gallery features one of the largest publicly available collections of small arms west of the Mississippi River. The Hall of Valor honors Oregon's Medal of Honor recipients with an interactive digital display where visitors can learn about the extraordinary individuals who performed





xpansion Wins Award

On June 12, the Happy Valley Library expansion was given an honoree prize for the Oregon Daily Journal of Commerce's 2024 Top Projects award. The Top Projects award celebrates the region's built environment, honoring the best building and construction projects in the Pacific Northwest. At the event, the DJC honored 53 transformative projects that improved structures, changed skylines and overcame obstacles to achieve greatness.

The library expansion stood

out because of its ability to maintain a single public-facing level for accessibility, despite challenging terrain, and its orientation towards the natural green space, which maximizes visitors' connection with the natural surroundings. The interior space features wood tones and durable, sustainable materials, which support a wide range of potential activities while ensuring easy maintenance. The project outperforms the Oregon Energy code by 30% made possible by the inclusion of a 33-kilowatt

solar photovoltaic array, all-electric HVAC systems and advanced insulation to improve thermal performance, and a robust stormwater management system to control runoff, protecting the adjacent habitat conservation

The award honors the collaboration of the City of Happy Valley, Bremik Construction, Scott Edwards Architecture, and multiple engineering firms and subcontractors that brought about the project's completion in the fall of 2024.

Intern Spotlight: Sofia Piccuci

This summer, the Happy Valley Library got some extra help from intern Sofia Picucci. A Happy Valley local, Sofia recently graduated from Milwaukie Academy of the Arts, where she was the Valedictorian of her class. Wasting no time, Sofia jumped into her role in supporting library programs and services while wrapping up her school year.

Sofia enjoys her job as an intern because it allows her to observe and better understand the more professional aspects of the library and its community resources. "The library allows me to connect with many different kinds of people; all library patrons come from a variety of backgrounds, and I believe that this connection is vital to understanding both the world and our lives," shared Sofia.

At the library, Sofia assists in weekly programs, works on special projects, and even designs some of the bulletin boards and displays throughout the building.

"In her short time here, Sofia has made meaningful contributions to the library youth services and programs. In addition to assisting with summer programs, she has researched mental health resources for teens and developed

craft projects for kids," noted Librarian Lisa Taylor, continuing, "her positive attitude and joyful presence are helping to make the library a fun destination this summer."

This fall, Sofia will be attending Oberlin College's Conservatory of Music in Ohio to study Classical Double Bass Performance. She will also be running Cross-Country as an NCAA Division III athlete for the school, and her plans don't end there. After graduation, she intends to play the double bass for a military band or orchestra, then begin her work towards a second career in criminal justice or library science.

In the meantime, Sofia finds excitement in learning what a library position could hold for her in the future, and library staff are grateful for her support in bringing services and programs to the community.





Clean Up After Your Pet for Healthier Water

Clackamas County has almost 100,000 dogs of all shapes and sizes. The Food and Drug Administration estimates that the average dog produces approximately three quarters of a pound of waste per day. That adds up to over 13,000 tons of pet waste in our county per year!

Reasons to Scoop:

- When it rains, storm runoff carries pet waste and other pollutants directly into waterways.
- Animal waste adds nitrogen to the water. Excess nitrogen depletes the oxygen in water necessary for beneficial aquatic vegetation, wildlife and fish.
- Animal waste may contain harmful organisms such as Giardia, Salmonella and E. coli that can be transmitted by ingesting contaminated water.
- Roundworms and hookworms deposited by infected animals can live in the soil for long periods of time and be transmitted to other animals and humans.
- Cleaning up after your pet is always the right thing to do
