City selects new Chief of police

Marcus Mendoza takes command of the Happy Valley Police Department in September

City of Happy Valley

Happy Valley welcomed its new Police Chief this month. A 16-year veteran of the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, Chief Mendoza will lead the **CCSO** officers contracted to serve Happy Valley residents through our partnership funded by the public safety levy.

Chief Mendoza was interested in law enforcement from a young age.

"I volunteered as a cadet with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office when I was 17 years old," Mendoza said. "Exposure to law enforcement in high school is what solidified my decision to pursue this as a career." After high school, Mendoza served in the United States Marine Corps, which he credits with giving him the foundation for a strong work ethic and a passion for community service. At the age of 21, he joined the Los Angeles Police Department, where he spent four years serving in a myriad of roles, including on mountain bike patrol, the traffic team and in undercover narcotics, among others. "Even though I grew up in the area, I wanted to work for the LAPD because it was a large agency, and I wanted to gain as much experience as I could," he said.

After his time in Los Angeles, he returned home to the Pacific Northwest, where he has lived and worked for the past 20 years.

"Happy Valley has seen massive growth and prosperity. I remember driving through Happy Valley as a teenager — it was a much smaller city then. I lived in Happy Valley for about five years before moving to a small farm south of town," he said.

For the last three years, Mendoza has served as the police chief for the City of Estacada. That experience has prepared him well for his new role.

"I come to Happy Valley with a feel for city government and an understanding of the contract relationship between the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office and the City of Happy Valley, and how that relationship benefits all of us," he said.

When discussing his priorities as he takes over this new role, Mendoza mentions community connection.

"My priorities are building relationships with the community, city staff, administration, and Happy Vallev deputies; maintaining a high level of law enforcement service for the city; and continuing to develop our personnel," he said. He plans to build those connections by attending and hosting community meetings and events, working with communications staff to share updates with residents and by being on patrol in the city. "My approach comes down to customer service. We make decisions that affect other people. Those decisions should be made using a fair and lawful approach. Your police department should help you and help maintain a safe environment where you live and work," he said.

Outside of his role as Chief of Police, Mendoza enjoys working outside on farm projects, including gardening and taking care of animals. Join the City of Happy Valley in welcoming Chief Mendoza! Camp Withycombe, City of Happy Valley celebrate their strong alliance

The partnership soared to new heights in 2025

Camp Withycombe, named after Governor James Withycombe, has been an important military training site and supply facility since its early 20th-century origins as the Clackamas Rifle Range.

Over the decades, it evolved into a robust base featuring historic structures, maintenance and logistics operations, and visitor space.

The base has played a pivotal role within the community of Happy Valley, fostering a partnership with the City that is a shining example of civilian—military collaboration, centered around honoring veterans and active-duty service members, and celebrating community spirit.

In 2025, Camp Withycombe actively engaged in multiple city-led events, including the Fourth of July Family Festival, Dumpster Day, and National Night Out. These collaborations help support our community and serve to shine a light on the service and sacrifice of veterans and military personnel within Happy Valley. The base also celebrated the reopening of the Oregon Military Museum, which welcomes visitors to learn about Oregon's military contributions at home and abroad.

The shared commitment between the City and Camp Withycombe also extends to promoting veteran resources, recognizing military partners at public gatherings, and even weaving military support into our civic infrastructure through parks and public art.

This partnership underscores the belief that honoring service isn't a one-time act but an ongoing effort that enriches both military personnel and the broader community.



6th Annual lemonade stand raises funds for childhood cancer research

Proceeds from the event go to Alex's Lemonade Stand **Foundation**

When local siblings Roslyn, 8, and Xavier, 12, Creech set up their lemonade stand at the Happy Valley Farmers Market, waiting for customers to approach their table, it wasn't a new toy they were working towards.

Instead, it was a chance to raise money for Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation. The national nonprofit organization aims to change the lives of children with cancer by funding research, raising awareness, supporting families and empowering everyone to help cure childhood cancer.

Childhood cancer research is an important cause for the Creech family, as Roslyn is a cancer survivor. "Roslyn was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia a few months before her second



birthday. Navigating the more than two years of chemotherapy and other procedures was challenging and life changing. Through it all, Roslyn was, and still is, so amazing, strong, and resilient," said the children's mom, Colleen Creech.

The annual event has taken place in August to mark the anniversary of Roslyn finishing her cancer treatment. "We like to celebrate her end of treatment anniversary by hosting a lemonade stand from which all proceeds are given to support pediatric cancer families and cancer research. There are still so many kids and families affected by pediatric

cancer. They need our community support, and our family will to continue to advocate for them," said Creech.

Mayor Tom Ellis was on hand at the event to deliver an honorary business license for the lemonade stand, and praised Roslyn and Xavier's dedication to helping others.















Throughout the year, the City benefits



Back to school, back to safety

Fire and life safety tips from the Clackamas Fire District #1

As families across Happy Valley prepare for the new school year, Clackamas Fire District #1 reminds parents, caregivers, and students that now is the perfect time to brush up on fire and life safety — both at home and on the way to and from school.

Whether students are walking, biking, taking the bus, or getting dropped off, a few simple precautions can help prevent emergencies and keep everyone safe.

Home Fire Safety Starts Here

- Test smoke alarms once a month and replace the batteries at least once a year. Make sure alarms are installed on every level of your home and inside each bedroom.
- Create and practice a home fire escape plan with your family. Identify two ways out of every room and agree on a safe meeting place outside.
- Keep backpacks, school supplies, and other items away from heaters, stoves, and open flames.
- Use power strips safely—don't overload outlets with laptops, chargers, or other devices.

Life Safety for Walkers and Bikers

For students walking or biking to school, fire safety goes hand-in-hand with traffic safety:

- Always use sidewalks and marked crosswalks. Never cross the street between parked cars or in unmarked areas.
 - Stop, look both ways, and

make eye contact with drivers before crossing the street.

Avoid distractions like phones or headphones while walking or biking.

■ Wear bright or reflective clothing, especially in the early morning or on cloudy days. Make sure bikers

Make sure bikers are always wearing a helmet.

Bus and Drop-Off Safety

■ Wait for the bus in a safe spot, away from traffic.

■ Stay seated while the bus is moving and listen to the driver at all times.

■ When getting off the bus, always cross in

front of the bus where the driver can see you—never behind.

Community Service Officer tackling wildfire risk in Happy Valley

Ben Hodges brings his love of the outdoors to his job

When it comes to keeping Happy Valley's green spaces safe from wildfire, one name keeps popping up: Ben Hodges.

Hodges, a Community Service Officer (CSO) with the City of Happy Valley, has been with the city for just over a year. In that time, he quickly became a key player in one of the city's most significant efforts: wildfire risk reduction. With his background in forestry, landscaping, and horticulture and a newly earned title as an ISA Certified Arborist, Hodges is helping lead the charge to keep Happy Valley's natural spaces both beautiful and safe.

Hodges' story starts long before the badge and arborist credentials. A lifelong Oregonian (aside from a brief, 10-year adventure in Spokane), Hodges has always felt most at home outdoors. Whether it was propagating plants in greenhouses or offering landscape consultations in the private nursery world, Hodges has spent his career working closely with nature.

"When our first child was born, I knew I wanted to do something that allowed me to give back to the community," Hodges shared. "Public service just made sense. It aligned with my skills and gave me more time with my family."

Hodges loves spending time with his wife and their two young kids, ages 4 and 2. As a family, they enjoy getting outside — whether it's hiking in the woods or playing at the beach. When he gets a little time to himself, Hodges likes to go kayaking, fishing, or watch soccer, which he's recently gotten into.

As a CSO, no two days are ever the same for Hodges. One day, he might be reviewing tree permits, the next out with Public Works inspecting trees on city property, while also enforcing municipal code and assisting police

with traffic accidents to keep the community safe and running smoothly. But it's his work with the Wildfire Mitigation Program that's taken off.

Drawing on his arborist expertise and years of hands-on experience, Hodges is now focused on inspecting HOA green spaces throughout the city, those treasured patches of forest and marshland tucked between neighborhoods. His role involves assessing wildfire risk, identifying potential hazards, and working closely with Homeowners Association (HOA) members to develop practical, sustainable solutions for keeping these natural areas safe and well-maintained.

"We're not trying to clear-cut anything," Hodges laughed. "It's all about balance and protecting the natural beauty while making sure we're reducing fire risk and creating defensible space around homes and structures."

Happy Valley was awarded a Wildfire Risk Reduction Grant, a huge step in funding and supporting this vital work. And it doesn't stop at city limits. Hodges also represents Happy Valley as a member of the Clackamas County Wildfire Collaborative, a team of public and nonprofit leaders brainstorming wildfire preparedness strategies across the region.

Earlier this year, the City of Happy Valley received a Wildfire Risk Reduction Grant from the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office and the Oregon Department of Forestry to help identify and address wildfire hazards within local HOA green spaces. With Hodges leading the charge, and with the tireless efforts of dedicated volunteers who have been instrumental in making this work possible, along with collaboration with Water Environment Services to secure additional grants, multiple areas identified

for wildfire mitigation work were assessed as part of the program. To support these efforts, the City used grant funds to purchase a trailer and outfit it with tools, creating a mobile resource hub that can be brought directly to neighborhoods for community cleanup events. HOAs have been encouraged to come together and take an active role in reducing wildfire risk. Thanks to Hodges's outreach, the hard work of some dedicated volunteers, and continued guidance, many green spaces have already completed cleanup projects and now meet key wildfire safety standards. It's a strong start to a long-term initiative and a big step toward protecting homes, families, and natural spaces throughout Happy Valley.

So, next time you're out enjoying a Happy Valley trail, maybe give a silent thanks to the guy behind the scenes making sure that beautiful greenspace stays wildfire safe.

City of Happy Valley

This July, Happy Valley welcomed new art to its public buildings.

Every two years, City Hall rotates the outdoor art on display with pieces from artists around the Pacific Northwest. This year, the rotation expands to include the Happy Valley Public Library as well.

This year's art display features several familiar local artists who have been showcased in Happy Valley before. Jenny Ellsworth from Oregon City is showing work at City Hall for the fourth time since 2015. Her current piece on display is titled Luna, with whimsical shapes of the starry sky carved into the steel of a spherical tank manufactured in 1946.

In discussion with Happy Valley staff, Ellsworth said, "I hope the community sees that old things can be turned into something new," a common theme in this year's pieces.

Earlier this year, the Public Art Committee received 45 applications from sculptors from Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Alaska. The committee made their selections of which pieces to display as part of the City's Sculpture Garden program. The program hosts a piece of art for a two-year term in a public space. The pieces are available for sale, with listed sale prices managed through City Hall. Several of the pieces hosted in the program so far have been acquired by the City for permanent display. Rick True's Speckled Redside Chromie was part of the Sculpture Garden program, but now is a permanent fixture in front of the City Library.

Reclaimed materials are a common thread through this year's selections. Travis Pond, another Oregon

City artist, installed Spirit of the Owl this year, a 3-foot owl made of reclaimed steel parts that stares inquisitively at the sidewalk and passersby. Pond's work is a familiar mainstay in Happy Valley, where he recently displayed Crane Study #47 at City Hall, and his imposing Eagle in Flight, a towering bald eagle made of repurposed military steel, spreads its 18-foot wingspan in the heart of Happy Valley's Veterans Memorial Park along SE 162nd Avenue.

"Half of what I do is collecting materials. I look for objects with significance and meaning, objects that have connections to us as individuals and as a whole. The scraps are part of our human history." Pond said. "For me, the question is never where to start. It is always where to stop. It is a constant look beyond the object, beyond the form, to what is next. Each circumstance, or in this case, each piece, spontaneously connects to the next."

This year's art selection includes two other prominent examples of repurposed materials welded into organic shapes. Portland artist Samir Sankari's Tall Bird combines piping, grating and rods into a towering shape that makes complicated geometric patterns against the sky. Oregon City artist, Suzie Beth, made her first piece of metalwork this spring to display in Happy Valley this year, The Center Will Not Hold, a towering flowershaped spiral of salvaged industrial chain.

Two of this year's new installations showcase their artists' love of wildlife and the outdoors:

Frisky Fillies by A. Lee Harris from Bonners Ferry, Idaho, is on display at the Happy Valley Library.

It depicts a rotation of wild fillies carved from polished granite, surrounded by pines below a pair of eagles in their skydance. Lee is a passionate traveler and stonecarver, and her pieces depict the wildlife of the American West in beautiful carved

Big Horn Sheep by the late Jim Johnson from Salem lovingly depicts the big horn sheep Jim would see while traveling through Canada from Alaska. Jim showed his pieces in Happy Valley several times before, including the towering raging stallion Fury and contemplative statue Fumiko, and it is an honor to showcase his work one more time.

Happy Valley has one other repeat artist on display this year. Ken Turner from Seattle installed Downpour, a towering stainless steel droplet. Turner said that he loves working with stainless steel because "the reflections demonstrate time as they change with the light. The reflections include the environment and the viewer as they move." Two of Turner's pieces have been displayed at Happy Valley City Hall before: Timeline Theory Reflection, a stainless steel tree, and Time Management, a stainless steel clock tower.

The remaining piece in this year's cycle is Leaf Spiral, by Ken McCall.

"My contemporary sculptures are inspired by natural forms," McCall said. "Leaf Spiral is inspired by the autumn leaves swirling down from the many trees in my hometown of Boise." McCall's public artwork is a common sight in the Northwest, including dramatic forms of horses and their foals, massive dandelions spreading their seeds, whimsical marshland creatures and the haunting Spirit of Injustice at Boise's Anne Frank memorial, but this will be the first time his art will be displayed in

Language changes, decreased attention and focus, poor judgment, thinking changes or memory decline will result in a dementia diagnosis.

needs, and the homeowners needs."

"First, I would say squeegee your shower glass door every day because, if you don't, you'll develop hard water marks which become really hard to get off," says Marrs.



hile many parts of the world assume that the finest seafood dishes come from places like Maine, Louisiana, or Connecticut, experts know the real gem of seafood smorgasbord is the Pacific Northwest.

With our proximity to the Pacific Ocean, we have access to incredibly fresh flavors of the sea, which provides local chefs the opportunity to reinvent classic seafood dishes.

their business ventures, sharing a singular goal with different skills and expertise to get there together.

"We balance out really well," says Daily. "We know our roles, stay in our lanes, but share equal responsibilities and ambitions."

In terms of the actual offerings at Kracked Crab, Daily reveals that seafood boils were always a part of his youth, especially on weekends with friends.

"We took our Taco Bell paychecks and went to get some crab for boils," says Daily. "It became a staple for us and we got really good at it."

Daily then talked about how they launched a seafood boil business in Salem and how it blew up "big time", leading them to pursue bigger opportunities across the state, and, while Happy Valley Food Station was initially unavailable, a slot for Kracked Crab seemingly opened up at the perfect time.

"Happy Valley had the nicest pod location in the nicest town and we always wanted to be there," says Daily. "Once we got in we realized it was the perfect place to grow a business."

So, after a few years at the Food Station, both Josh and Todd had their sights

set on a bigger opportunity after discovering that the vacant building at the Happy Valley Town Center, formerly occupied by businesses like Applebee's and the Happy Valley Food Hall, was seeking the next brave renter.

Luckily, both Josh and Todd were able to bring their new business idea of Sunnysides to life, featuring a slew of unique and exciting vendors that mesh everything we love about our blended community into one big kitchen. With options like The Last Sip, Kung Fu Tea, The Dumpling Boys, Korndog Kings, and Rolls & Rice, all inhabit original menus with tantalizing aromas.

Of course, at the helm is Kracked Crab, where epic boils mesh with epic flavors thanks to their famous "drips", or seasoned infused butters that make each boil special.

"Gartlic parmesan is our most popular drip," says Daily. "Cajun is a close second,

followed by lemon pepper and honey garlic."

The dishes themselves feature, depending on what you buy, a variety of shrimp, crab, and lobster boils with accompanying sides tossed in the mix, such as corn, eggs, spuds, sausage, and more. The menu also includes dishes like fried fish, chowder, lobster mac, and more.

"We were able to open in May," says Daily. "We really wanted to create a space for young entrepreneurs who exhibit quality service with a quality product. My Navy experience helped me set this kitchen up to be efficient and effective and the county helped us construct the rules for the city's only food hall. So far it's been great."

One cool aspect we discovered was Daily's commitment to the community, including hosting UFC nights and latenight hours for Clackamas High School Varsity football nights. However, this is not the endgame for Josh and Todd.

"Once everything settles, we're going to be the longest full-service food place open in Happy Valley," said Daily. "Our hours are as late as 2:00 in the morning. That's why the bar at Sunnysides is called 'The Last Sip'."





Little League team shows grit in playoffs

n the world of Little League Baseball in the state of Oregon, few teams accomplished what a local team did this past June.

The Nelson Lottis Senior American baseball team, comprised of local 7th and 8th graders, was one of only eight out of 66 teams statewide to qualify for the state tournament, held in Banks, Oregon.

The path to state qualification was far from easy.

This qualified the team for the county tournament,

where they placed second, with the top two teams moving on to state.

ed Lincoln City 14-1, but then ran afoul of Banks, who, after beating them, went on to win the state title. Coach Lottis continually used the term "felt improbable" when describing the way the team performed.


"It's like they didn't read the fine print," Lottis said.

"They shouldn't be able to do it, and so they went out and did it."

Though their season ended in the second round of the state tournament, Coach Lottis beamed with pride, both as a coach and a father. "It was great to see the Nelson name get so much play and respect."

In the end, however, it was about the boys, and their growth and coming together not as individuals, but as a team.

"These boys discovered it was not about individual performance," Lottis said. "They learned to trust each other, support each other. All the boys were each other's biggest fans."
