Introduction & Methodology

From October 12-19, 2023, DHM Research conducted a survey of registered voters in Happy Valley. The purpose of the survey was to gauge voter support for a bond measure to build a community center in Happy Valley, determine voters' priorities and preferences for the community center, and identify key messages to communicate with voters about the measure.

Research Methodology

The survey consisted of 200 Happy Valley registered voters and took approximately 12 minutes to complete. This is a sufficient sample size to assess voter opinions generally and to review findings by subgroups.

Respondents were contacted from a list of registered voters. Telephone respondents were contacted by a live interviewer and text-to-online respondents received a text invitation directing them to an online survey. In gathering responses, a variety of quality control measures were employed, including questionnaire pre-testing and validation. Quotas were set by gender, age, educational attainment, race and ethnicity, political party, and area of the city to match the profile of likely voters in the May 2024 election.

Statement of Limitations

Any sampling of opinions or attitudes is subject to a margin of error. The margin of error is a standard statistical calculation that represents differences between the sample and total population at a confidence interval, or probability, calculated to be 95%. This means that there is a 95% probability that the sample taken for this study would fall within the stated margin of error if compared with the results achieved from surveying the entire population. The margin of error for this survey is $\pm 6.9\%$.
