SAFETY FIRST

For the safety of residents, businesses, and visitors to the City, temporary camping is only permitted in areas of public-right-of-way between 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.

Temporary camping is also solely permitted in commercial and industrial zones, where vehicles do not travel. Additionally, temporary camps must be located more than 100ft. from any residential area and more than 1,000ft. from a school.

All persons camping temporarily MUST comply with all laws and regulations. This includes:

NO ALCOHOL OR DRUGS

NO LITTERING

NO PUBLIC URINATION OR DEFECACTION

NO PUBLIC NUISANCE:

Includes use of fireworks

Open burning

Noise violations
