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## The community rallies around e-bike safety

*City of Happy Valley*

More than 100 community members came together on Thursday, April 9, for a city-hosted forum focused on e-bike safety, and the message at the end of the night was clear: Happy Valley is ready to work together to find a solution.

Hosted by the City's Traffic and Public Safety Committee, the forum was held in response to a growing number of concerns

over the past year about the use of e-bikes in the community. Residents showed up both in person and online, filling the room and creating a space for open, honest conversation.

People shared personal stories, concerns, and experiences, whether as riders, parents, or neighbors. While perspectives varied, the tone of the evening remained thoughtful and respectful.

By the end of the discussion,

there was strong agreement on one key idea. The goal is to strike a balance. The community wants to continue to embrace e-bikes as a valuable and enjoyable way to get around, while also ensuring everyone rides safely and responsibly.

The biggest takeaway was not about the bikes themselves, it's about how they're being ridden. Rider accountability and riding behavior emerged as the clear

# Happy Valley Students win \$100 in annual "If I Were Mayor" contest

Every year, the Oregon Mayors Association hosts a statewide contest to help educate students in grades 4 through 12 about the function of a city mayor.

Each student is encouraged to develop a project or initiative they would lead if elected mayor of Happy Valley. The contest has three categories based on student grade, with different entry requirements for each. Elementary students in 4th and 5th grade submitted posters, middle school students submitted essays and high school students submitted digital media presentations.

All the students did an incredible job this year! Ideas included building more community gardens and increasing community involvement with events like city-wide cleanup days. Members of the Happy Valley Youth Council reviewed nearly 30 entries and selected the winning submissions for each category.

The winners were contacted in late March and invited to City Council on April 21st, where they were recognized by the Council and received their cash prize. Their names were also submitted to the Oregon Mayors Association for the statewide competition, where they have the opportunity to win additional prizes totaling over \$500.

Thank you to everyone who participated in this year's contest. The City encourages all students in grades 4 through 12 to consider participating next year. Your ideas and creativity just might shape the future of our community.

Coming from six years at Roosevelt High School in Portland, where they were crowned PIL Champions last year, Coach McCants brings a wealth of high-level experience in the game. Hailing from California, he played football at Oregon State University.

"I forged lifelong bonds there, great people and coaches," he explained. "I

would not be here at this program if it were not for them."

Coach McCants has very specific and ambitious goals for the program.

"Of course, there are the wins. That's what we are here for. But we will be emphasizing the process, to create a culture of no excuses, discipline, and a high degree of accountability," he said.

Coach McCants brings classroom experience, too. Following graduation

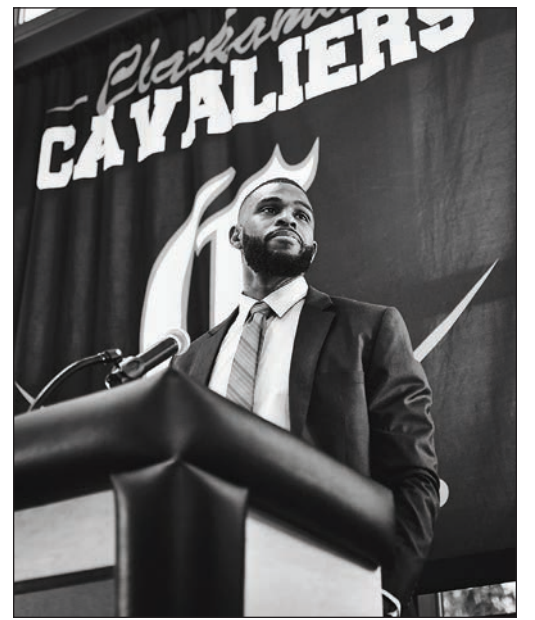
from OSU, he received his Master's in Education from Marylhurst University, then spent seven years as a social studies teacher and the last three as Dean of Students at Roosevelt High School.

He was especially excited about the support the program has from the Athletic Director, John Arntson and Principal Alyssa Engle, as well as from the parents of the players and the student body as a whole.

"I was blown away by it," he explained. "We are all on

this journey together."

CHS athletic director John Arntson can already feel the change. "I am really excited about Coach McCants taking over the football program at Clackamas High. Already he has brought a ton of energy and excitement to the program. The football players and the community are energized and you can feel a new buzz around the program. I am very much looking forward to what is ahead for Cavs Football."

focus moving forward.

City staff confirmed that those themes will guide the development of a new ordinance to address reckless riding and establish meaningful consequences when safety is at risk.

Steve Campbell, Director of Community Services, said the forum was a great example of what makes Happy Valley special.

"I'm incredibly proud of our community for coming together to help solve an issue like this," Campbell said. "We had meaningful, thoughtful conversations and ultimately landed on a shared goal, creating a culture that is both welcoming and holds people accountable when their actions put others at risk."

Happy Valley Police Chief Marcus

Mendoza echoed that sentiment, emphasizing that the goal isn't to take something away from the community.

"This is not about restricting people from enjoying e-bikes," Mendoza said. "It's about making sure everyone, riders, pedestrians, and drivers alike, can feel safe. Responsible riding behavior is key to maintaining that balance in our community."

Campbell added that the city wants to make sure e-bikes remain a positive part of daily life in Happy Valley.

"We want kids and adults alike to have the freedom to ride," he said. "With the hills in Happy Valley, we understand that motor assist can be necessary. Our goal is to make sure everyone can enjoy that experience safely while continuing to enjoy everything our community has to offer."

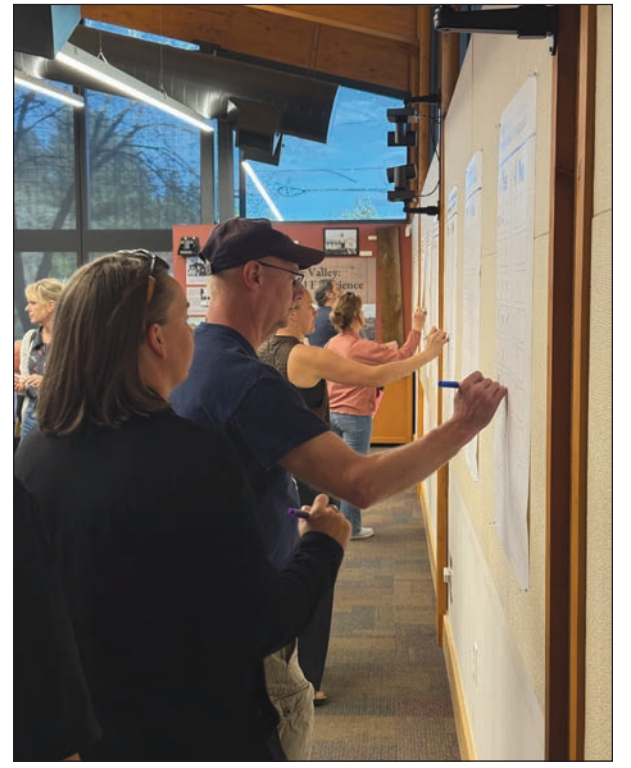
Over the next two months, the city will begin drafting a proposed

ordinance based on feedback collected not just from the forum but also from months of community input. Once a draft is ready, it will be shared with the public before heading to the City Council for consideration and adoption.

The city is also exploring the creation of safety and training classes to help riders better understand the rules of the road and how to operate e-bikes safely.

For those who couldn't attend, there will be more opportunities to stay involved. Updates and timelines will be posted on the city's website, and residents are always encouraged to reach out to City Hall with questions or feedback.

If Thursday night was any indication, Happy Valley is more than ready to tackle this challenge together, working toward a solution that keeps the community both safe and connected.

If you know a high school



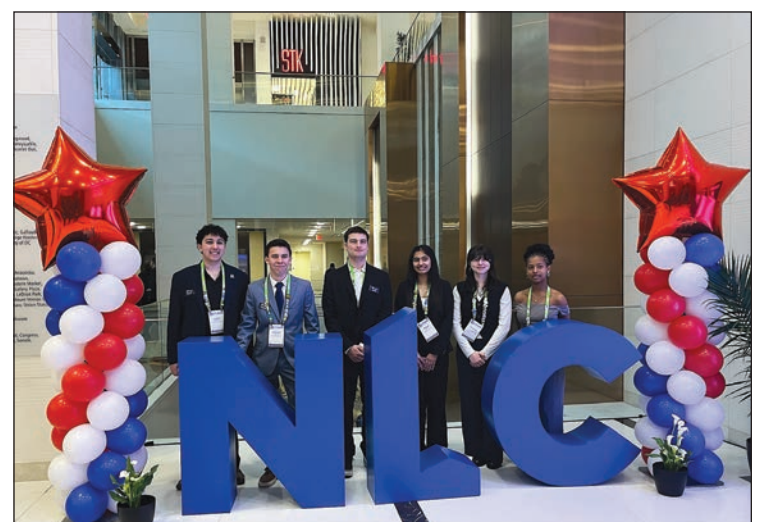

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## Clackamas County Mayoral Summit

City of Happy Valley

Last month, Mayor Ellis joined several other mayors at the annual Clackamas County Business Alliance Mayoral Summit. The top projects from the City of Happy Valley that Mayor Ellis highlighted include:

1. Expanding 172nd Avenue: Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin in 2027 on widening 172nd north of Sunnyside to the Scouter's Mountain Road Roundabout. For more information on this project visit happyvalleyor.gov

2. New Public Works Facility: The City purchased property on Armstrong Circle to build a new Public Works Facility. Right now, the Public Works Department, which does everything from park and road maintenance to responding to inclement weather operates out of a 1,000 square foot building at Happy Valley Park. The City is in the design phase for a modest but more modern facility that ensures the team can continue providing critical services

to the community. For the last several years, the City has been saving funds so that no new taxes are needed for this facility.

3. New Community Park: The City is in the design phase for a future 40-acre community park east of 172nd Avenue. Similar to the Public Works Facility, the City has been saving funds, mostly from development fees, to fund this project which could be under construction

as early as Spring 2027.

4. Future Main Street: The City purchased 35 acres east of 172nd to be a future Main Street for Happy Valley. This is a long-term vision of the City Council to have a vibrant mixed-use area. While development may be years away, we are hopeful to be under construction providing key infrastructure in the next year or two.

**Preparing for wildfire season starts at home**



As we head into warmer, drier months, May is recognized as Wildfire Awareness Month. It is a timely reminder that preparation starts long before the first smoke is in the air.

While large wildfires may seem like a distant threat, the reality is that homes in and around Happy Valley can be vulnerable to fast-moving grass fires and ember storms. Small actions taken now can make a big difference in protecting your home and your neighborhood.

Creating defensible space is one of the most effective ways to reduce wildfire risk. This means maintaining a buffer around your home that slows the spread of fire and gives firefighters a safer area to work. Start by clearing dry leaves, pine needles, and debris from roofs, gutters, and around your property. Keep grass trimmed short and remove dead vegetation, especially within the first five feet of your home.

It's also important to consider what you store near your house. Firewood piles, outdoor furniture, and flammable materials should be kept at a safe distance, particularly during fire season.

Clackamas Fire offers a free wildfire home assessment program to help residents

personnel evaluate your home and provide personalized recommendations to improve defensible space and reduce hazards. It is a simple and effective way to get expert guidance tailored to your property.

Beyond your property, having a plan is key. Make sure your household knows multiple ways to leave your

neighborhood in case of an evacuation, and sign up for local emergency alerts to receive timely information.

Clackamas Fire encourages residents to take advantage of the spring weather to get ahead of wildfire season. A few hours of yard work and planning today can make all the difference tomorrow.

## Clackamas Rotary Foundation launches scholarship

A new scholarship opportunity is set to recognize and support local high school seniors who have balanced academics with the demands of employment.

The Clackamas Rotary Foundation has announced the Ralph and Joyce Carter Endowment Fund Scholarship, which aims to help students with limited financial resources pursue higher education or vocational training.

The scholarship honors students who have demonstrated resilience, responsibility, and determination by working while completing their high school education. Designed to ease the financial burden of post-secondary schooling, the program will award \$2,500 to each recipient for their first year of study, with an additional \$2,500 available for the second year. The second-year award is contingent upon successful completion of the first year and maintaining a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5.

Each year, three graduating seniors — one from Clackamas High School, Adrienne C. Nelson High School, and La Salle High School — will be selected to receive the scholarship.

To be eligible, applicants must be graduating seniors who have worked part-time or full-time during high school, demonstrate financial need, and plan to enroll in an accredited community college or trade or vocational school. The foundation emphasizes that while academic performance will be

considered, greater weight will be given to work ethic, perseverance, and commitment to future goals.

Applicants will be evaluated based on their employment history, financial need, educational aspirations, and personal character. The selection process also considers the applicant's dedication to continued learning and their ability to maintain academic progress.

To qualify for the second-year award, recipients must complete their first year of post-secondary education, maintain at least a 2.5 GPA, remain enrolled in an eligible program, and provide official transcripts verifying their academic performance.

The application process requires students to submit two letters of recommendation — one from an employer and one from a high school staff member — along with a completed application detailing work history, activities, and a short essay. The essay asks students to reflect on how working during high school has shaped their lives, including its impact on their education, family responsibilities, and future career goals.

All application materials must be submitted by May 15, 2026.

Foundation representatives say the scholarship reflects a commitment to uplifting students who have shown exceptional dedication and grit, ensuring they have the opportunity to continue building a brighter future through education and skill development.

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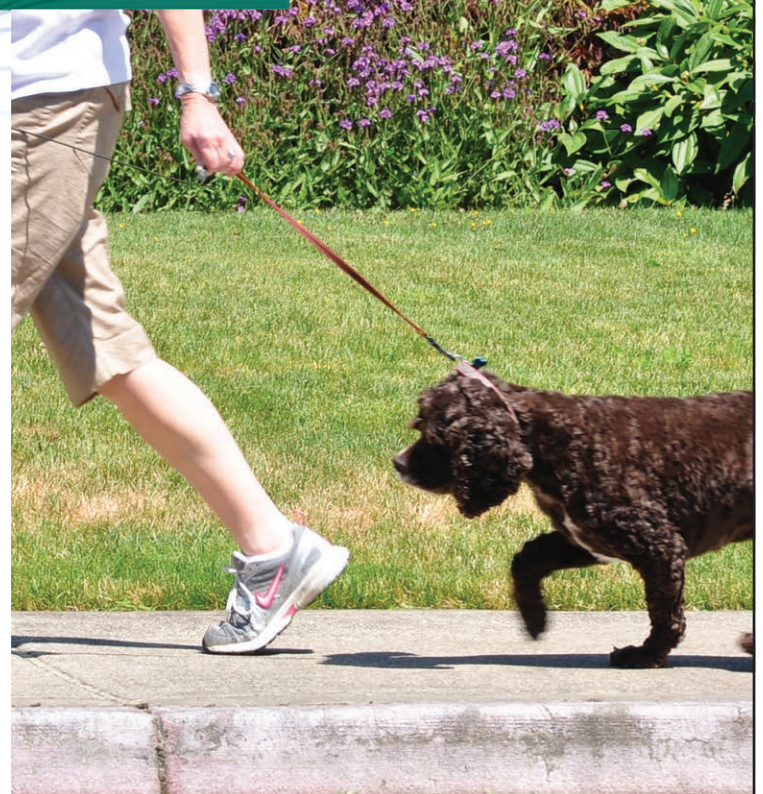

■ **Rumors & Musings:** With the openings in



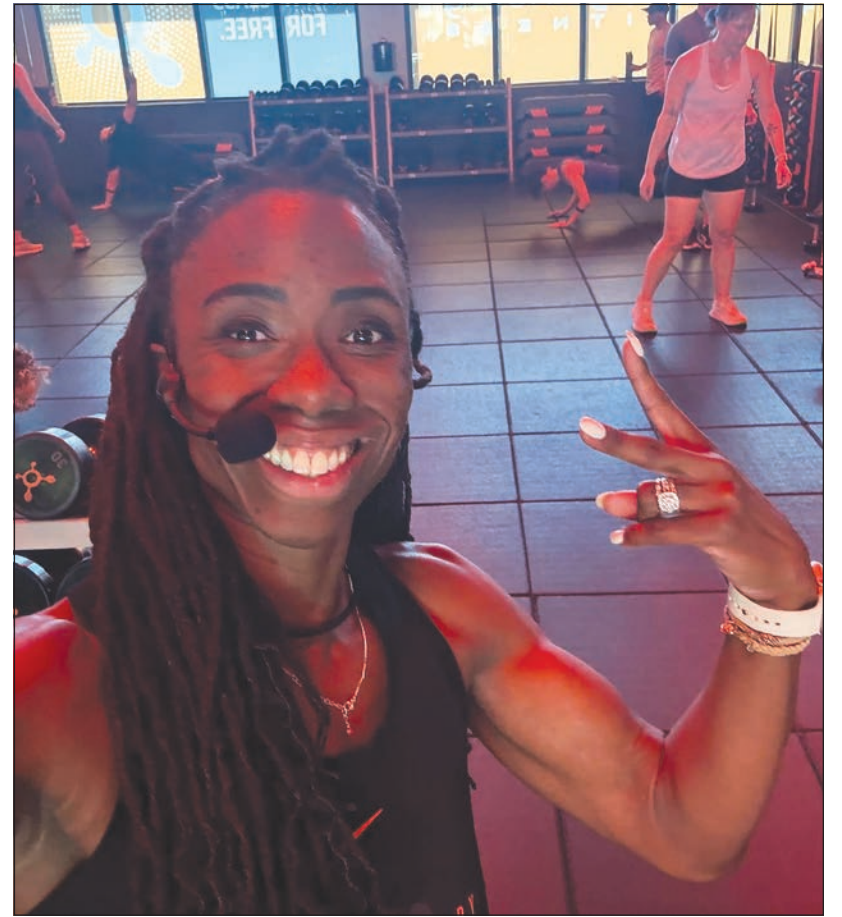

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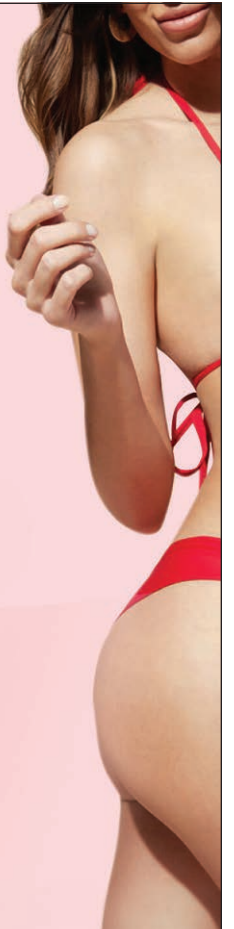
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# CODE CORNER

## Now is the time to remove noxious vegetation

Trees and flowers are blossoming, but so are the grass, weeds, and other noxious vegetation

City of Happy Valley

The city's municipal code requires the maintenance or removal of vegetation that poses a hazard to traffic, safety, and community health.

Vegetation that obstructs walkways or roadways, for example, creates mobility challenges for pedestrians and vehicles, and brush that has been left to overgrow and become brittle is at risk of creating a wildfire. On top of that, noxious vegetation that poses significant health risks due to its toxicity can make it downright impossible for anyone in its vicinity to enjoy the outdoors.

In Happy Valley, it is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that noxious vegetation, such as grass, blackberry bushes, ivy, and other plant life, does not become a problem. With everything in full bloom, we'd like to encourage the community to check their yards, parking strips, and other property to confirm that this type of vegetation isn't a concern. Our team will work with you to devise a plan of action should your property be out of compliance, but ultimately, it is up to property owners to address any concerns and avoid a formal citation.

**Noxious vegetation includes:**

- Weeds more than 10 inches high
- Grass more than 10 inches high
- Trees, bushes, roots, other natural growth, soil, or solid waste that obstructs public sidewalks or roadways.

Tree branches and shrubs that encroach in the public right-of-way can create a safety hazard. Ensure your sidewalks and streets remain clear for travel so pedestrians and service vehicles can pass easily.

■ Dead or decaying trees or tree limbs, dead bushes, stumps, and any other thing likely to cause a fire or that presents a safety hazard to the public or to neighboring property owners.

■ Uncontrolled growth of weeds, bushes, berry vines, poison oak, poison ivy or grasses, which provides a place of refuge for rodents, contributes noxious pollens to the atmosphere, poses a fire hazard or unreasonably interferes with the use and enjoyment of public or private property.

■ Trees and bushes on property or right of way need to be trimmed to at least 7 feet about the sidewalk area and 11 feet about streets or alleys.

■ Hedges and shrubs need to be trimmed to allow a minimum of 3 feet of horizontal clearance between the edge of the pavement and hedges, shrubs, or other vegetation.

For more information or to review the City's rules as they relate to noxious vegetation, check out 8.08.290 of the Happy Valley Municipal Code at: hv.city/code.

**Get a jump start on yard maintenance NOW!**

To help motivate residents to tackle overgrown vegetation, there will be an opportunity to dispose of extra yard debris during the City's upcoming Dumpster Day event on June 13th. A standalone recycling station at Happy Valley Public Works will offer residents a place to dispose of seasonal yard debris, courtesy of Happy Valley Parks and Recreation. Residents are responsible for unloading and de-bagging their drop-off materials on-site.

**Location:** 13910 SE Ridgecrest Rd, adjacent to Happy Valley Park

*This is a residential service only, which means NO commercial landscaping or contractor loads will be accepted and proof of residency is required.*

As you take advantage of yard cleanup opportunities, please remember that yard debris should not be blown or placed into the street. The City's street sweeper is not intended for the removal of yard debris, including leaves and grass clippings.

Street sweeping is designed to maintain clean and safe roadways by removing dirt, sediment, and other small debris. Placing yard debris in the street can create safety hazards, clog storm drains, and negatively impact water quality.

Property owners are responsible for properly disposing of yard debris through approved methods, such as yard waste collection services or events like Dumpster Day.

We appreciate your cooperation in helping keep Happy Valley's streets safe, clean, and well-maintained.

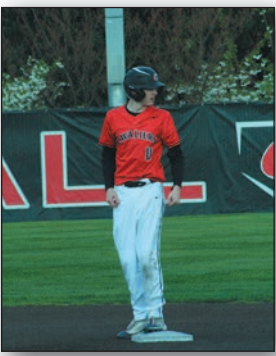


### Justin Diep Senior Boys Tennis

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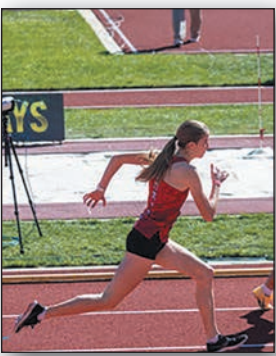


### Kyle Kristensen Senior Baseball
